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DFEH Creates Advisory Group to Study Local Enforcement of State Employment Anti-Discrimination Law

Group formed in response to Governor's veto message of SB 491

Sacramento - The California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) announced today the formation of an advisory group to study the feasibility of local government enforcement of the employment provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA). In California, employment anti-discrimination law is enforced by private lawsuits or by lawsuits brought by DFEH or the Attorney General's office. FEHA preempts local governments from enforcing its protections.

The advisory group is being convened in response to Governor Brown's October 14, 2017 veto message of Senate Bill 491. The group will study whether the law should allow local authorities to enforce FEHA and provide a report with findings and recommendations to the Governor and Legislature by December 31, 2018.

"We continue to see thousands of complaints of workplace harassment and discrimination filed every year in California," said DFEH Director Kevin Kish, who convened the advisory group. "As we study the feasibility of local enforcement of the FEHA, we encourage local governments to do everything in their power to inform workers and employers in their jurisdictions of antidiscrimination rights and responsibilities."

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The DFEH is the state agency charged with enforcing California's civil rights laws. The mission of the DFEH is to protect the people of California from unlawful discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations and from hate violence and human trafficking.
